



**Dutch grading system and grading culture**

When studying at European institutions, one will notice immediately the difference in grading scales but also different ways of using them in different subject areas. There are many different grading systems such as (from lowest to highest grade) 1 to 5, 1 to 10, 1 to 20, 1 to 100, 5 to 1, F to A. In the Netherlands, a ten point system is often used in both secondary and higher education. A grade of 10 is the highest and 6 is the minimum pass grade. The grade 5.5 will often be rounded up to “6”. At the Amsterdam University of the Arts (AHK), different grading systems are applied depending on the subject area such as music, theatre, dance, cultural heritage or architecture. This could be a ten-point-system, a system with letters or description; a four-point-system is for instance applied for architecture.

**The grading culture of the Academy of Architecture**

*The Academy of Architecture applies a four points grading system starting from F (fail) to EXC (excellent). The grade ‘EXC’ is rarely given. The Academy applies an so-called absolute system; the grade reflects the individual score of the student and unlike the US system, the grade is not given in relation to the level of the entire group in the same course.*

*Distribution of grades less than V (Sufficient) is rare, partly due to the fact that regular and exchange students must pass a demanding selection before they can admit to the course. Exchange students are only allowed to take courses in the second and third year of the four-year master’s program.*

The Dutch educational credit system is 60 ECTS per year. An academic year consists of two semesters of 30 ECTS.

\*If pass requirements have been laid down for a particular examination, test or proficiency assessment, the requirement shall be met when the student achieves a grade of higher than 5.5 or the assessment “Passed”.
